#### 6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

#### 6.3.1 Curriculum Development

Being affiliated college we do not have any role to play in curriculum development, however, some BOS members from our college have made significant contributions to curriculum development.

#### 6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

A session of 90 minutes for each subject, is being introduced in BBM and BCA course. The first 45 minutes are devoted to teaching and the second 45 minutes are utilized for practice of writing and evaluation of whatever is written on the subject taught.

#### 6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

The semester exams were conducted as per university time-table, and evaluation work was undertaken in all subjects conducted by Gulbarga University Gulbarga at Pariksha Bhavan. The class tests and internal assignment tests were conducted for all semester students and the answer scripts were returned to the students after evaluation was over.

#### 6.3.4 Research and Development

The institution motivates teachers to undertake minor and major research projects, encourage publications amongst students and teachers, encourage teachers to participate and organize seminars, symposia, conferences and workshops. The institution facilitates researchers with the required infrastructure facilities including internet connectivity, subscription to research journals, reduction of teaching work load, hassle-free correspondence with agencies involved in research activities and researchers are given free atmosphere to peruse their work.

#### 6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

The library committee is constituted, headed by a senior faculty as a coordinator and all other departmental heads together to look after the best usage of available resources in the library by the stakeholders. The committee also finalizes purchase and procurement process of books, e-journals and other reading materials. The Institution has the best of the digital infrastructure. Up-to-date computer facility, with latest computer hardware installed with current versions of licensed software, is in place. Internet hooked LAN system. The seminar halls and audio-visual room are installed with computers, LCD projectors for online teaching and reference. The administration wing is fully computerized.

Various committees have been formed to look after academic, examination, infrastructure and other aspects. Each committee will have a coordinator and two to three faculty as members. This has enabled the administrators to run and develop a college in a right direction.
